New for 2020: Attitude to Learning (AtL) grades!

2020 marks the replacement of separate class work and homework effort grades at Parmiter's with one **NEW** overall Attitude to Learning (AtL) grade for each subject. Ms Absalom, Assistant Headteacher, tells us more about these changes.

What is an 'attitude to learning' and why is it important?

In the most simple sense, an attitude is a state of mind about an object, fact or situation. Since attitudes are revealed through our behaviour, the way we behave lets others know our state of mind about something. Psychologists say that we tend to do what we tell ourselves to do. Therefore, if we have negative attitudes, these negative attitudes affect what we expect of ourselves which in turn, affects our actions. For example, those with the negative attitude that they "can't do Maths", are almost assured of trouble when attempting maths! A negative attitude limits performance, saps motivation and inhibits learning. However, attitudes are not fixed. Once acquired, we are not stuck with them forever!



There is no guarantee that anyone will instantly be able to understand, for example 'Macbeth', through eliminating a negative attitude about it. A less inhibiting attitude such as, "In the past I may have not done well in English, but I can still learn about Shakespeare and achieve better grades in the future," removes self-imposed limits. This more positive attitude creates the opportunity for learning and motivation that leads to success, regardless of past performance. By changing this negative attitude into a positive one, the door is opened to the possibility of not only learning about 'Macbeth' but becoming really engaged with the act of learning itself!

We believe all students have the capacity to grow as learners, regardless of academic ability. Our new grading system reflects the level of engagement with their own learning, including learning that takes place outside of lessons, that students demonstrate to their teachers. It is our hope that students

reflect on their own attitude to learning and look to improve it, therefore improving their own academic outcomes. For more details on AfL, please see this [link](#).

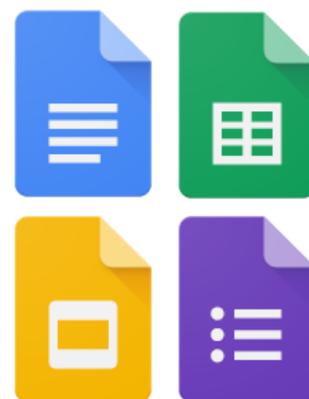
Since 2018, Parmiter's have been using Google Apps for Education and we are now a Google School. Being a Google School means we use a range of applications from Google Docs
