Service of Nine Lessons and Carols, St Albans Cathedral






Monday 12 December started with an unexpected fall of snow which added a festive feel as student musicians made their way to St Albans Cathedral to rehearse for the evening's Carol service.

Sport

It has been a joy to see all our facilities, practices and fixture list so full this term. We have, so far, had over 40% of the entire school represent Parmiter's in a competitive fixture and at the time of writing have competed with 55 different teams, across 8 different sports and 179 fixtures!

As our traditional football season draws to a close, there are still many of our teams left in positions to win leagues, qualify for league finals and continue to progress in national and county cups. The Year 7A boys team remain undefeated across 17 games. They are still going strong in the National Cup and will contest for a place in the last



16 in January. They have made it to the quarter final of the County Cup and are currently sitting top of their Watford District League. The 9B team also remain in the National Competition and are awaiting their last 32 match versus either Cambourne Village College or Samuel Whitbread Academy. The Year 10A team are also still in the hunt for a league final position, with two big games left to play in the New Year. Our girls teams continue to impress with the U13 and U15 teams still going strong in the Schools Cup. The U15s will be travelling to play a school from Sutton, with the U13s hosting Forest School.

The Netball season is in full swing with many of our teams recording some fantastic results. The top performer's at the moment have to be

our Year 8A team who remain unbeaten in the league. The Year 10A team have also impressed with some excellent wins over St Margarets and RMS. Our Year 7 teams have continued to make excellent progress and were rewarded with wins against Queens, following tough matches with Haberdashers.

It has been great to see our teams on the hockey pitch again, particularly our Senior team. The girls performed fantastically against Aldenham and were rewarded with a hard fought draw. They played exceptionally well in the District tournament against some tough sides, finishing in 3rd place. Our Year 7 team went one better in their game against Aldenham with a comprehensive 6-1 victory. This was followed up with another comfortable victory over

St Michaels.

Our first silverware of the season came in the District Cross Country Championships with our Year 7 Boys and Year 10 Girls both being crowned District Champions. There were individual medals for Max Henson, Peter Bansaghi and Gina Luckhurst.

All four of our table tennis and badminton teams were successful in the District Championships and all qualified for the County Finals. Our U13 Boys and Girls both performed admirably, with some excellent table tennis being played to finish 4th in their respective competitions. Our U16 Boys and Girls teams also contested the finals, with the boys qualifying through their group and into the 3rd and 4th place play off. A strong performance against St Albans Boys resulted in them being awarded the Bronze medal. Our U16 girls went one better, finishing their tournament unbeaten and being crowned Hertfordshire County Champions. They will now go on to represent Hertfordshire in the Regional Championships in January. The Herts Championships bought much success for all of our teams with all of them finishing in the top 4. The Under 14 boys played magnificently and were unlucky to finish in 2nd place, behind St John Lawes. The U16 boys narrowly missed out on a place in the 1st and 2nd place game. They went on to win the 3rd and 4th place match to get the bronze medal. The girls also performed really well with the U14 girls playing some excellent badminton to finish in the Silver medal position. The U16 girls had a really tricky tournament with some brilliant shot making,

finished in 4th place.

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And finally, but my no means least, it has been fantastic to start our basketball season. Although most games will be played in the New Year, our Year 7, 8 & 9 teams have all begun their campaigns. A first win was in order for the Year 7s against Watford Boys. The Year 8s and 9s both played St Clement Danes with the Year 9 team losing by 5 points but the Year 8s winning by a comfortable margin of 41-10.

A great big thank you to all those students who have committed to our practices and clubs this term. We wish you all a very happy Christmas and New Year and look forward to welcoming you all back in 2023.
