## CAREERS EVENTS OF THE SCHOOL YEAR 2019 – 2020

During this unprecedented time many of the careers events planned for this year had to be cancelled, including work experience programmes, The Medical Conference, Summer School, work shadowing, visiting speakers, a royal navy day and careers matching tests. During the lockdown period from March until the end of the summer virtual events, work experience, university taster courses and open days, Mooc courses and Morrisby online tests were offered to students online. Employers and universities were helpful in offering online opportunities which many of our students took up. As an example the Brighton and Sussex Medical School work experience was listened to by most of our medical school applicants and Speakers for Schools introduced Virtual Work Experience to continue to provide a range of opportunities to help ensure young people gain crucial early experiences of work during this time and beyond.

### Universities and Apprenticeships Opportunities held at Parmiter's

### **Universities and Apprenticeships Fair**

Students in Years 10 - 13 were invited to attend and speak to representatives from the universities, further education colleges and organisations offering apprenticeships to help with their future career planning. Students prepared for the fair beforehand by researching the list of universities and organisations attending and preparing questions to ask. The day included an Oxbridge talk for students who were considering Oxford or Cambridge courses.

Lancaster - Thank you very much for inviting us, the students at Parmiter's were fantastic, we ran out of prospectuses in the process. A couple of students I spoke to also attended the open day the Saturday just gone, so I hope they enjoyed it!

*Liverpool* - They were very much clued up on what to ask and what they wanted to do so it made for a really good visit.

*Exeter* - our student ambassadors, Chris and Sophie, offered glowing feedback about their experience at the Parmiter's Fair, and praised the positive attitudes of the students to whom they spoke.

#### **Mock Interviews**

Once again we were delighted to welcome professionals, who included governors of the school, parents and old Parmiterians, to conduct mock interviews and advice to Year 13 students preparing for their Oxbridge, apprenticeship and university interviews. The process is invaluable to our students and we are always grateful for the time and input given by the volunteer interviewees.

#### **Alumni Coffee Morning**

We welcomed ex Parmiterians back to the school who came to talk to students in Years 11, 12 and 13 about their different career paths and the choices they made after leaving Parmiter's. It was a great opportunity for students to hear about their experiences and put questions to them informally. Subject areas included Veterinary Medicine, Economics & Finance, Engineering, Teacher Training, Art, History, Accountancy, Equine and Fashion Photography, Actuarial Maths, English Language and Literature, Computer Science, Law, PPE, Medicine, Sports Science.

**PwC interactive session** run by business ambassadors who had recently joined PwC on a graduate or school leaver programme. It included recruitment processes and employability skills advice; coaching and an introduction to PwC and the profession as well as information on the work experience and school leaver opportunities, including apprenticeships and degree programmes.

#### **Lloyds Banking Group**

An ex Pamiterian and other senior managers from Lloyds delivered a session which included goalsetting, a team enterprise session, the creation of an app and a presentation from the students. It provided essential meaningful time spent with an employer as well as providing essential employability and life skills.

#### **Dyson Workshop**

An ex Parmiterian and a colleague of his on the Dyson apprenticeship scheme came in to deliver the workshop to Year 12 STEM students which included a talk about Dyson and an introduction to the Dyson Institute of Engineering





and Technology (DIET). They then experienced robot programming using Lego Mindstorm where students were tasked in programming a prototype and adapting this to fit specific criteria.

#### **Parents Apprenticeship Evening**

This event provided the opportunity for parents and students to find out more about Apprenticeships, from Traineeships to Higher Apprenticeship. Presentations were given from an expert from the Apprenticeship Support and Knowledge for Schools Programme (ASK), an employer from Gas Mark 1 who employs apprenticeships and ex Parmiterians following foundation and higher degree apprenticeships. Parents were able to find out how apprenticeships work and were given advice on how students can apply for apprenticeships. It was a well-attended evening with excellent feedback:

#### Women in Economics Day at Gonville & Caius College, Cambridge

A Level Economics students from Parmiter's were able to attend this day for the fifth year running. This year explored how women made the West rich and discussed some of the big questions facing economists. Leading feminist and Caius Economist Dr Victoria Bateman introduced her new book, The Sex Factor: How Women made the West Rich, and Dr Sara Reis, Research and Policy Officer from the Women's Budget Group discussed the organisation's role in scrutinising government policy. Kate Bell, from the Trades Union Congress (TUC) also spoke and Dr Laura Harvey, from the University of East Anglia, introduced her own research on income inequality and gender. The girls were also able to hear from current students at Caius, who discussed their experiences of studying economics at university and the types of opportunities it has opened up.

#### Other career events at Parmiter's

#### **ARMY DAY**

Year 10 were given the opportunity to take part in an elite skills army day. They faced mental and physical challenges in small groups with the purpose of developing their leadership, teamwork, confidence and communication skills. They were instructed by lance corporals who all had different roles in the army, and gave them advice and discussed army life with them. It was a very good day and feedback from students showed they





had enjoyed it. Comments included the benefit of meeting army personnel in real life and not just having the impression of the Army given on screen and through the media.

### Year 11 Employability Workshops

Delivered by IGD Employability Programmes Team, students in Year 11 were able to choose two one hour workshops to attend from Finance, Marketing and IT. Student feedback after the session showed unanimously they all felt more prepared for the world of work, had developed their employability skills and wanted to know more about routes into the industries.

## Engineering: Creativity, Fulfilment and Making Life Better Why there has never been a better time to do it

David Horton left Parmiters in 2002 to do a degree in Mechanical Engineering at Imperial College and is now Chief Engineer of the UK's only homegrown, high-tech, green train technology company. He gave a wonderful talk about why there has never been a better time to choose Engineering as a career, how it is fundamentally a creative occupation, pays very well, gives you a job for life, you can make a real difference to people's lives, and you don't need to be a genius at maths either. He spoke about his company Vivarail, and their focus on applying 'green' technology to rolling stock in order to meet the decarbonisation 'challenge'. He described their current work in producing battery trains and hybrid trains to replace diesel trains, and their aspirations to develop a hydrogenpowered train and even a steam train! The talk was brilliantly received by our students who were inspired by his enthusiasm and knowledge of the industry.

#### **Warner Brothers**

Students from Years 8 – 13 were given the chance to attend a very visual talk about Warner Bros and opportunities at the studio. Three of their Education Facilities team brought in props & costumes which brought the presentation to life. The students went away with a general knowledge of the creative industries and subjects and jobs relating to these as well as an insight into the Warner Bros Studio and job opportunities there.


## **External Trips**

### Insight day at Skanska
