World Book Week was filled with literary enthusiasm and student engagement. We started each day with bookrelated challenges to encourage excitement and participation among students. Congratulations to the winners, Ishan Bills, Olivia Iype, Louis Healey, Harshal Shah and Maya Gulamali who received $£ 5$ Amazon vouchers for daily challenges for their enthusiasm and creativity.


Throughout the week, we had the pleasure of hosting author Caroline Boxall, who visited our Year 7 students and concluded her visit with an exciting book sale. We organised the BBC Young Reporter workshop, which ignited the journalistic passions of our Year 8 and 9 cohorts. We had many notable competitions such as the Extreme Reading Challenge and the Redesign a Book Cover competition, which showcased students' talents and creativity. Although it has been a really short half term, we have still managed to fill it full of action-packed sport! This is an important term for the end of many of our winter sports and I am delighted to report on many successes.

In my last report, I wrote about the impending District Football finals, which 3 of our teams had qualified for. It was successful for both Year 8 and Year 9, but disappointing for Year 11.


The Year 8 team competed against The Grange Academy who they had previously beaten in the league stage. This game was no different, with our boys controlling the match from start to finish, winning the tie 5-1. The Year 9 s , playing in their first League final, played Queens School. An outstanding team performance, including some individual brilliance from Jaquim Veneracion, helped the boys to a 2-0 win and the District title. It wasn't to be for our Year 11 team, who played our arch nemesis, St Clement Danes. A goal conceded in the first few minutes was not the best start and, despite battling back to level the game, they fell to a 3-1 defeat.


The U13 girls were also awarded the title of District Champions after they won their final league game 4-1. It is our girls' team who are flying the flag in the County competitions. The Under 13 team remains the team to beat and will contest the County Final on Wednesday 17th April vs Presdales School. A brilliant win against a strong Ashlyns team in the semi final was one of the highlights of the year. The U14 team couldn't quite match their younger counterparts, following a defeat to Presdales in the semi final. Who will win the battle in the final remains
 to be seen!

The basketball season has seen success for our Year 9 team, who remain undefeated in the league and won the district title for the third year in a row. We have entered this team into the County League next year where we hope they will be challenged. The Year 10 team were narrowly pipped to the post by The Grange Academy who beat our boys by 8 points to win the league.

Our hockey squads have had mixed results against the local schools. Special mention to our Year 8 team who remain undefeated. There were particularly strong performances against RMS, St Michael's and Aldenham School.

Congratulations to our U16 Badminton team who performed so admirably in the East England Finals. Wins against the representatives of Cambridge, Norfolk and Suffolk saw the team compete against Bedford School for a place in the National Finals. It was neck and neck throughout all 5 games, with our team missing out on qualifying by 2 single points! Nevertheless, an amazing achievement to get so far in the competition.

Our netball teams are awaiting the results of their leagues and I hope to be able to report success in the summer term. It is looking promising for our Year 9A and B teams, and we hope to be singing their title winning praises in a few weeks time. The annual District tournaments have taken place for
 all teams, all of whom enjoyed successful performances against all other schools in Watford and the surrounding areas. I want to acknowledge the improvement the Year 8 team has made over the course of the season. Having really struggled in Year 7 , the team have shown incredible commitment and have been rewarded with some brilliant results.

Despite there being no formal rugby leagues, our teams have mustered some brilliant performances and have been justly rewarded. The Year 7 team finished their season unbeaten with a fine $25-10$ win over St Clement Danes and a 10-5 win over St Joan of Arc. The Year 8s have demonstrated resilience and determination and, despite not winning any of their games, have continued to make progress. The Year 9s have been hit with many cancellations and still have games to go against St Clement Danes and St Joan of Arc. The Year 10 team continue to be successful, showing a brilliant performance against St Joan of Arc winning 27-14. They are due to play St Clement Danes before the end of term. The Senior squad were on fire in a friendly against Dame Alice Owens winning 64-10, with Year 12 Student, Joe Kelly, contributing 4 tries in a polished performance.


As the weather improves, we are looking forward to seeing the return of our summer activities, starting with the Senior Cricket National Cup game on Sunday 21st April. Our County League season begins on Thursday 2nd May with training beginning after Easter.
