#### **Sixth Form**

Given that this is another year group who did not have the chance to sit external GCSE examinations, their commitment and resilience is all the more impressive. Equally impressive has been the news of some quite exceptional university and apprenticeship offers that have been received by so many of our current Year 13s. The fact that Parmiter's currently receives more Oxbridge offers than many prestigious independent schools is a testament to the work and dedication of our students, as well as the inspirational leadership and support provided for the application and interview process by Mr Porter, Mrs Rowland and the Sixth Form team.

#### Careers and apprenticeship opportunities

Of course, Parmiter's does not see itself as simply an "Oxbridge" school but instead we are invested in supporting each and every student to access the very best course available when they leave our Sixth Form or, if they choose, move onto college or another school after their GCSEs. As regards post 18 opportunities, we are also well aware that neither Oxford nor Cambridge hold a monopoly on the best degree opportunities which, for some students, are better met through other prestigious universities or the Degree Apprenticeship scheme offered by a number of Britain's most prestigious businesses and corporations.

To that end, our careers advisor, Mrs Zanetti, continues to provide outstanding careers advice opportunities for students from Year 7 onwards. This includes a BBC Bitesize Careers event which was held in school in January and enjoyed by students in Years 7 to 10. For older students and their parents and carers, we also ran an Apprenticeships Awareness Evening which was followed by a virtual "Meet an Apprentice" evening. We were indebted to a number of our recent alumni who either returned to school in person or who joined us on-line to share their experience and offer tips and guidance about their own experience of undergoing a degree apprenticeship. Another example of how true it is that "Once a Parmiterian, always a Parmiterian!"

#### **The Winter Picnic Concert**

As ever at Parmiter's, it has certainly not been all work and no play. Earlier this week the Winter Picnic Concert took place in which 74 students performed in small groups or the larger Jazz Workshop band. Pieces ranged from Gershwin's challenging "Rhapsody in Blue" to a rendition of "Eye of the Tiger" on the flute! The musical talent at Parmiter's is staggering, as also testified by our A Level students' recital evening at the end of January. On Saturday 4th February, The Parmiter's First Lego League Team attended the First Lego League Regional Competition at the University of Greenwich. The team had been working since September to prepare for the competition, which was against eight other teams across London and the South-East.

The competition required teams to use their creativity and STEM skills to design and programme a Lego robot which autonomously completes predetermined tasks within a time limit. The team did a fantastic job designing a modular robot, with specialised attachments to complete each task. The robot was efficient but, at times, Temperamental, giving the team the opportunity to demonstrate their resilience, positive attitude and excellent problem-solving skills to work through each of the problems.

The team was also required to present their Innovation Project to judges. The project requires competitors to solve a problem linked to the theme of sustainable energy. The Parmiter's team had identified plastic pollution in the oceans as their area of concern and came up with NaTURE as their solution. An underwater, rubbish extraction robot inspired by the shape of an anglerfish which can bring plastics back to land for processing. The team had a range of ideas to power the robot, including electrolysis of sodium in the water, radioisotope thermoelectric generators and a nuclear fission reactor. Their presentation of ideas really showcased their strength of teamwork, communication and creativity.

The team did themselves proud. Although they did not win the regional competition the judges were so impressed with the team's ability to overcome challenges with positivity that they awarded them the Judges' Award!









As ever, the Parmiter's community responded without delay as we publicised our appeal for items following the terrible earthquakes suffered in Turkey and Syria earlier this week.

We were very quickly made aware that there were problems getting these items into the countries affected and, although we were able to donate what you had already given, we were asked not to collect any more.

It has been suggested that the best way to help is by offering financial assistance.

As we approach the business end of our winter sports, I write with excitement about some successes.

In Netball, there are still many league games to be played before Easter and I hope that I will be able to write with details of some league winners at the end of the Spring Term. Special mention to the Year 10A girls team who have made it to the semi-final of the Herts Plate and are awaiting the winners of Rickmansworth and St Edmunds for a place in the final. There have also been strong performances from the Year 8 girls' teams vs St Clement Danes and the Year 10 girls against Immanuel and St Michaels.

The Basketball season is well and truly underway with some strong performances from our teams. It has been great to see the Year 7s play with such passion and determination, demonstrating excellent progress week by week. The stand-out performance came against St Clement Danes where they recorded a 24-22 win. The Year 10 team performed well as a team to beat Bushey Meads but we were unlucky to lose to Watford Boys a week later.

Despite the awful winter weather, the Rugby season has begun earnestly, although a little more slowly than we would have liked. The Year 9 team set the tone with a fine 15-5 victory over Sandringham School. The Year 10 team were impressive in their 71-5 victory over Queens in the District League. Special mention to the Year 8 team who are unbeaten with wins against JFK and Sandringham. With games coming thick and fast after half term, we have Year 9 and 10 semi-finals to look forward to along with league games against St Clement Danes, Rickmansworth and St Joan of Arc.

The Hockey season has seen great success, especially with our Year 7 teams who have started their career with wins against St Michaels, RMS and Aldenham. The Year 8 team have made vast improvements and continue to make progress each game, getting well deserved wins over Rickmansworth and Sandringham. The Year 10 team have impressed, especially with two hard fought 0-0 draws against Dame Alice Owens and RMS.

As the football season draws to a close, I am pleased to report that we have completed all District League matches across all ages, boys and girls. The Year 7 teams continue to perform well and have amassed a huge 40 fixtures between them! The 7A team will play in the County Semi Final after half term and hope they can progress to the final. In the league, first position has been secured and will play St Michaels in the final in March. They will be joined by the Year 10 team who also won their regular league and are likely to play Rickmansworth in the final. At the time of writing, the Year 7B team are still going strong in the National Cup and are travelling to Bromley to play Ravens Wood for a place in the ¼ final.

The U13 girls' team have finished all their leagues, playing 9 matches with 8 wins and only one defeat to Croxley Danes. We are awaiting other results to find out whether they will be crowned champions. The U14 girls remain in the County Cup where they will play John Henry Newman in the ¼ final after half term. The U15 girls have finished their season with their stand out performances coming in the National Cup. They travelled to Surrey and, despite playing really well, were on the wrong end of a 2-1 defeat.

In the annual District Swimming Gala, it is fair to say that Parmiter's dominated with our teams winning 19 out of 44 races to be crowned Watford District Champions. Strong performances from all swimmers were seen but special mention to Dan Ord, Ben Taggart, Sophie Coleman, Peter Bansaghi and Ramsey Gill who won all their races.

We entered 19 students into the annual Cross Country Championships with the students representing Parmiter's as individuals. Archie Marshall finished 6th in the Senior Boys Race and will now travel as part of the Hertfordshire team for the English Schools Championships. Other notable runs came from Max Henson in the pre junior boys race, finishing in 12th position.

Next half term sees the build up to our annual Performing Arts Show, which will be held at the Radlett Centre on Monday 27th and Tuesday 28th March. Please look out for more details on this when we return.
