Anthony Nolan and Blood Donation: Our Sixth Form students showed immense maturity during the Blood Donation visit and Anthony Nolan event.

We were honored to welcome members of the Parmiter's Almshouses and Pensioner's Charity from Bethnal Green for an afternoon of carols and fun. This was a moving opportunity for our students to connect with our history and support our former community members.

Our poignant Remembrance Parade allowed the whole school to pause and reflect with dignity with a moving assembly from Mr Redmond honouring Christopher Harrison, an Old Parmiterian who sadly lost his life in Afghanistan.

Aspiration and Academic Excellence

We continue to set the bar high, providing the

opportunity for every individual to grow. This half-term has seen some truly prestigious achievements:

A massive congratulations to our debating team for their victory in the South-West Herts Debating competition. This prestigious event was hosted by Gagan Mohindra MP at the Houses of Parliament and judged by the Lord-Lieutenant of Hertfordshire, Robert Voss CBE CStJ.

In the GCHQ competition, our top team placed 29th out of over 2,500 schools nationwide, which is a staggering achievement.

Our students have remained focused through Trial Exams, Maths Challenge Competitions and the Oxford Model United Nations. While our Year 12 and 13 Economics students attended a conference featuring Ed Balls and other keynote speakers, the Sociology students visited the Royal Courts of Justice and West Herts College.

Creativity and Exploration

From the stage to the laboratory, our students have immersed themselves in a wealth of experiences:

We were treated to an incredible performance of Twelfth Night, creatively set in 1960s London, with a fantastic soundtrack dreamt up by Mr Froy and Miss Windmill and executed beautifully, in the round, over three nights, by our very own Parmiterian Players. If you missed this year's school play, I urge you to keep the dates free in 2026 so that you can join us next year. We further explored careers available locally with the filmmakers evening, where students enjoyed an evening at Warner Bros. Studios, which even saw our school featured on BBC News.

More in school performances included a visiting MacBeth performance and some more of our own Parmiterians performing in the vibrant 'Plugged In 3' concert, before our very own House Pantomime Competition closed the curtain on the year of in school performances, the talent on display is breathtaking, oh yes it was!

Students explored the future at the Animal Aid Science Conference, took part in the Bright Sparks Computer Science visit and Year 10 Design and Technology students visited HH Global.

Our students have truly been global citizens this term, with successful expeditions to Iceland, Washington and a Sixth Form visit to Berlin.

Sporting Prowess and Seasonal Fun

Our athletes have been equally busy with a jam packed schedule of fixtures you can read about on the following pages, from Ski Team Training at the Hemel Snow Dome to a unique Real Tennis trip to Hatfield House. 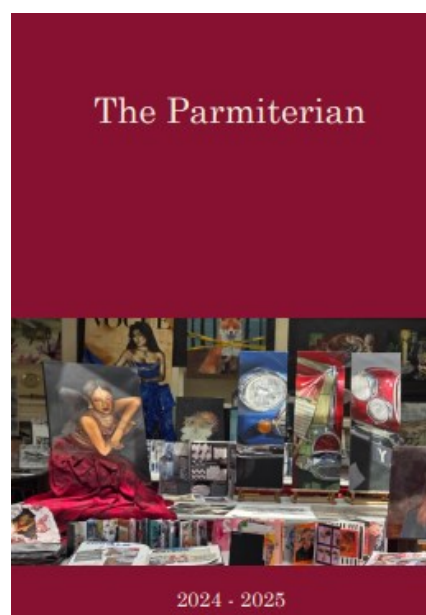

Estate Developments: Building a Better, Greener Parmiter's

Over the past year, a number of important site improvements have been completed across the school, each designed to enhance the learning environment, improve sustainability, and support our growing school community.

One of the most visible changes has been the installation of new window walling in the Main Block. These modern, energy-efficient windows provide far better insulation, helping classrooms stay warmer in winter and cooler in summer. The result is not only a reduction in energy use, but also a more comfortable and consistent environment for learning. The refreshed façade has also given the heart of the school a bright, contemporary look.

The installation of new internal fire doors throughout the Main Block has further improved safety, accessibility and the overall appearance of the building. Both this project and the window walling works were made possible thanks to the generous support of the Parmiter's Foundation Trust, whose continued investment helps ensure our facilities meet the highest standards for students and staff alike.

A new addition to the school grounds this year is the **Snack Shack**, a purpose-built outdoor food kiosk that has quickly become a favourite with students. By expanding our food offer and reducing queue times at lunchtime, the Snack Shack helps ensure everyone can enjoy a wider variety of healthy, freshly prepared food in a shorter space of time. This project was funded through the generosity of the Parents & Carers Association, whose support continues to make a real difference to daily life at Parmiter's.

Sustainability remains at the heart of our development plans. The installation of a 215kW battery marks a major step forward in our journey to become a more energy-efficient and environmentally responsible school. This state-of-the-art system allows us to store electricity generated by our solar panels (located on the Main Block, English Block and Conference Centre roofs) and use it when demand is highest. By managing our energy use more intelligently, we are reducing both our carbon footprint and long-term energy costs. Each of these projects represents an Investment, not only in our facilities, but in the experience of every student, creating a more sustainable, comfortable and inspiring place to learn.

Anthony Nolan Event - Wednesday 3 December 2025

The Sixth Form held their Anthony Nolan awareness event again this term and had 52 students who came forward for a cheek swab, so that they can be registered on the Anthony Nolan database of possible stem cell donors. 6 volunteers from the Anthony Nolan charity visited the school to help students who wanted to join their register by doing simple cheek swabs. One said "Many people haven't heard of stem cell transplants – but 2000 people in the UK need one each year. Future of Science Conference

15 Year 12 students attended an incredible Future of Science schools conference hosted by Animal Aid in central London.

The students all learnt so much from the excellent talks, panel discussion and workshops. Students were amazed by what companies like XCellR8 and InterNICHE are doing to improve the teaching and learning for future medics, whilst moving away from having to use animals.



Christmas Cards of Kindness

The Christmas Cards of Kindness project started during the COVID-19 lockdowns and aims to connect young people with elderly members of the local community. The idea of the project is to write a kind message in a card and post it to someone who might like to receive it.

As part of the Sixth Form tutorial programme, students are invited to write a Christmas card. These are then collated and sent to residents of over 30 different local care homes in and around Hertfordshire. This year, students sent over 450 Christmas cards and postcards, filled with messages of goodwill. Year 12 and 13 students have been delivering these to the care homes, in person, in the run up to the Christmas holidays. Our more artistic students also put a lot of care and effort into decorating envelopes, to ensure the post looked extra special when it was received.

Lower school students were also invited to get involved, by visiting the library at break time, to write cards for people who will be in-patients at Watford General Hospital over the festive period. Students made their own cards, or chose one from our card shop. We collected an amazing 350 cards in the post box. Students were awarded house points for their contributions, with Woolley House coming out on top, collecting an amazing 285 points for their card writing efforts.

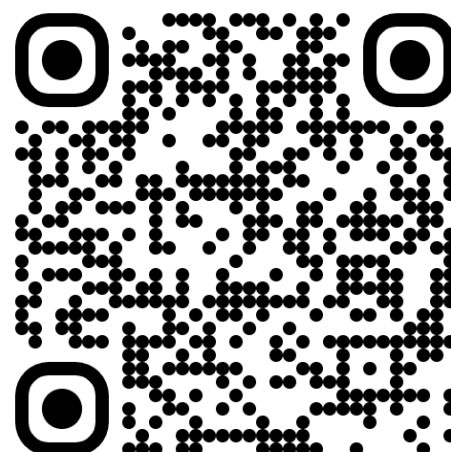
5. Support Ongoing Fundraising Projects
