






## PERFORMING ARTS SHOW

Xander also had help from the Frontier, all the members of Band Development Programme (BDP) and numerous members of the Creativity committee. The concert itself acted as a showcase for the work of the Band Development Programme. Over the past year, students who wished to form a band together, could turn to the BDP for advice and guidance. It was created by Yusuph Choudhury as a foundation for older students to support younger ones in their journey, allowing them to share their knowledge gained through first-hand experience. And through persistent dedication and hard work, the bands were able to rapidly improve their playing, until it all culminated in some of their first concerts.







As well as this, the concert featured many other creative and musical acts. Several students collaborated on duets throughout the evening: Bronwyn Bates was accompanied by Natesinee Piper on the piano, and Thomas Kin & Aviv Panicker played a guitar duet. Amidst band performances, many other students played solos, some singing and some playing an instrument. On Sunday 23 March 2025, 46 singers from Junior and Senior Choir travelled to the prestigious Royal Albert Hall in the heart of London to take part in the Hertfordshire Schools' Gala. This is a biennial event which marked its 30th anniversary with the theme "For The Record", representing a wide selection of music spanning genres and generations.

We performed in the afternoon concert alongside the Hertfordshire Schools' Symphony Orchestra as well as other primary and secondary schools. Performing in the afternoon concert, the Hertfordshire Schools' Gala began at 1.45pm, welcoming a large audience. The programme commenced with a thrilling orchestral rendition of 'Also Sprach Zarathustra - Sunrise, Op. 30' by Richard Strauss, before the massed choirs joined in with 'If I Had Words' by Camille Saint-Saëns. From there, a range of other songs were also performed, including but not limited to: Cass Elliott's song "Make Your Own Kind Of Music"; "Control" by Zoe Wees; and a fantastic finale based on John Farnham's song "You're The Voice" which featured the massed choirs, the the Hertfordshire Schools' Symphony Orchestra, drummers, the HMS Steel Orchestra, and dancers.





Being part of a massive group of musicians across Hertfordshire was a phenomenal experience, celebrating such musical diversity with an uplifting and upbeat atmosphere and at such a special venue.

These would all not be possible without LRC staff (led by Mrs Mullett and Mrs Faisal) and the librarians who contributed greatly to the week!



### CAROLINE BOXALL VISIT

On the 3rd and 4th of March, Year 7 were treated to a talk with a local author, Caroline Boxall. She showed all the students a captivating presentation that ignited their passions for reading and writing. Within the presentation, there was a fun quiz and she taught the students about a charity that she greatly cares for and supports called Railway Children.

She told the devastating tale of the street children in India and the dangers they have to face when they have nowhere to go due to neglect. Railway Children try to help and provide support to as many children living in poverty on the streets as possible before they fall into the hands of an abuser.

She also spoke about the books that she has written- The Secret children of India Series (about street children in India trying to escape poverty) and The Ember Enigma Series (A Russian spy story for young teens with powerful messages about dementia, PTSD, and stroke).



As well as this, she got many students excited about her creative writing competition. You would write a short story with a theme of 'courage' and send it to her for a chance to become a published author in one of her books. She recommended to people who wanted to participate to buy her 'Crazy Creatives' book which contains a short story writing course. Hiding inside one of her books she was selling was a golden ticket and if you won it, you would gain free access to her book!




# HACKATHON

The Hackathon was an exciting coding event which was led by passionate 6th formers (William Taylor and Kai Young). There were three main coding/hackingbased challenges the attendees took part in: one which involved reverse engineering (breaking up the code of a program to see how it works) a computer program made in the Python coding language; another where students found the answers to web-based quizzes by looking at the source code (the code a programmer writes); and a final challenge where attendees hacked into a web application using a strategy used by real hackers: 'SQL injection'.



There were attendees from Parmiter's, Merchant Taylors', Rickmansworth, Watford Girls and Queens'. Each school was represented by a team of five people: one from key stage five, two from key stage four and two from key stage three. At the end of the event, individual prizes were awarded. Can you guess which school won the overall competition? Correct, it was Parmiter's! Our school came in 0th place (in Computer Science, you always start counting from 0).



As if the 6th formers hadn't already done enough, the software that allowed attendees to take part in the challenges was all hand-coded. Overall, the Hackathon event was another huge success to join the long list of huge successes at our school!

# LANGUAGES WEEK

The annual event led by the MFL department saw many participants giving presentations about their languages and the culture that surrounds them. Due to the school's diverse range of national identities, students had a wide selection of presentations to attend, in Gujarati, Mandarin, Farsi, and Polish.

These presentations involved students finding creative ways to demonstrate the features and customs surrounding their languages, whether it be through getting the audience to pronounce words, how to spell basic phrases, or even a Chinese name generation website (which I must admit I have spent a bit too much time on).

The Mandarin session was led by Tilly Chan, Sheryl Su and Yanyi Lu. There was a classroom full of participants, who were all active and engaged with the presentation. Basic phrases were covered, such as Hello (你好), Goodbye (再见), Thank you (谢谢). Interactive activities were utilised frequently, for example, participants were encouraged to repeat back phrases said to practice their pronunciation and speaking skills. There was also a fun (but unofficial) Chinese Name Generator used, found with this link:


Participants had fun inputting their names and finding their names in Chinese, but did need some help on the pronunciation. The rest of the presentation included basic phrases you learn in French and Spanish/German in your first year of learning at Parmiter's, such as your age and your nationality. Something else unique added nearer to the end of our presentation was the Chinese Zodiac animals, where your animal is decided on your birth year and the cycle of animals repeats every twelve years- for example, 2025 is the Year of the Snake.

The session wrapped up well as lunch ended, and the participants seemed satisfied with the Mandarin Taster Session.

As you can see, there are many different people who were able to express their identities through the language they speak. This goes to show how wonderful an occasion Parmiter's Languages Week truly is; may next year's be just as brilliant!

#### BAND DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

The Band Development Programme (BDP) is the music department's newest addition to their numerous student opportunities here at Parmiter's. The program was started by Yusuph Choudhury, and his band 'The Frontier', as their contribution to the progressive creativity of the younger years. It has the aim of helping each of the enlisted bands' progress to reach their full potential and perform their music in the BDP's signature "Plugged In" concerts, as well as in their practices, to allow them to flourish to the highest level of musicians. Working tirelessly inside and outside of school, the BDP team has already put on 2 concerts this year, and are planning a third in the summer for their year 7 bands. We also aim to host another in the autumn term of next year for all bands.





These concerts have proved to be an excellent place for many acts to perform, with the last concert consisting of an arrangement of bands, duets, solos, and dancers, allowing for as many people to play to the 120+ audience members and get performance practice.

But, the band development program isn't just about performing within the band's comfort zone: the BDP team works with the individual members of each band to help them improve at their chosen instrument as well as expand their musical repertoire and try different styles of playing and different cultures. We are extremely proud of the diversity of bands throughout the BDP, because it allows us to encourage learning from one another and mixing of tastes in music and styles of play.

As of early March, leadership of the BDP has transitioned from Yusuph to Claudia Dean (Lead Singer of The Frontier) and Natesinee Piper (Lead Pianist & Head of Compositions of The Frontier). Together, these Year 11s are dedicated to helping each band reach its full potential while maintaining the high standards set by the program. Their combined expertise in performance, composition, and musical direction ensures that every band continues to grow and thrive under their guidance.

To enhance the efficiency of band rehearsals, they have teamed up with Xander Pearce (Solo Bassist) to develop a structured roster for the Band Crate—the shipping containers outside the history block equipped with a variety of instruments. This new system ensures fair access to equipment, allowing bands to maximize their practice time and refine their performances. Their leadership marks the beginning of a more streamlined and collaborative approach within the BDP, fostering creativity and musical excellence.

The future of the Band Development Programme looks brighter than ever, with a strong foundation built on passion, collaboration, and a commitment to musical growth. Under the new leadership and continuous mentoring from 'The Frontier', the BDP continues to evolve, providing students with the tools, guidance, and performance opportunities they need to develop as musicians. As the programme expands, so does its impact—encouraging creativity, confidence, and a deep appreciation for music across all year groups. With more concerts, new initiatives, and fresh talent emerging, the BDP is set to inspire the next generation of musicians at Parmiter's for years to come.
